Playground

Don't forget how to find your way back to the Playground!

Hold onto your berets, folks, because "Playground" isn't an art show of the old boys' club—it's a wild ride through the weird and wonderful perspective of eight fearless gals from Advanced Studio Practice. But it's not all fun and games, "Playground" is a riotous rebellion against art-

world seriousness. These artists are challenging the loss of play that comes with adulthood and are using it as a tool for fearless experimentation. So, put your outdoor shoes on, and join us on the Playground to celebrate the graduate work of Alina Karmadanova, Caise McLellan,

Ciara Myshrall, Grace Hallewell, Ivy Grenier, Katherine Neily, Emily Dào, and Becca Hanley.

The theme of "Playground" is more than just a catchy tagline; it's a guiding principle for these artists who defy the pressures of adulthood. They see the world through the curious eyes of a child, where every material, shape, and colour hold the potential for pure magic and creation.

At the playground, a safe space is created, to share stories, to try things and explore without the pressure of expectation. A safe space where difficult matters come out easier, free of the taboo and complications of adulthood. They recognize that building a successful career requires hard work, daily practice, and critique. But at the heart of it all, play is their chosen attitude, inspiring us all to embrace our inner child and find joy in our work.

This graduate exhibition is a whirlwind of sensory experiences from the five different disciplines they have worked in: Ceramics, Jewellery-Metal Arts, Textiles, Fine Art Illustration, and Photography / Videography. The artworks aren't just static displays; they're eager to tango with your emotions and even

provoke existential questions (or at least make you wonder why everyone isn't pursuing art and loving their careers as much).

Playground isn't about conforming to rules; it's about knowing them but trying something different to see what happens. It's a celebration of weirdness, quirkiness, and everything that makes us human—flaws and all. The final showcased works offer commentary on valuing women, the nature of love, cherishing girlhood, embracing whimsical moments in design practice, and commenting on the uncomfortable, often macabre topics that only kids will talk about because they don't know not to mention sensitive subjects.

Design isn't just about aesthetics; it's a language that simplifies complexities and communicates the heart's desires. At first, all play is pretend practice. In design we use play as a preparation ground for the real world. Our students have spent an intense year practising in our Playground in the company of artist peers, who keep it real, cheer them on, and give them a push every now and again. They have shown they are willing and made a leap of commitment towards a serious design career. In other words, they are ready.

Alina Karmadanova is a Siberian artist, illustrator, and anti-war artist from Russia. She holds a Bachelor's degree in Architecture and Design from National Research Irkutsk State Technical University, Russia and a Master's in illustration from Falmouth University, UK. From 2018, Karmadanova spent five years residing and creating art in Shanghai, China, before relocating to New Brunswick, Canada, to study the Advanced Studio Practice program at the New Brunswick College of Craft and Design.



I value women's position in contemporary society, and my work is a feminist act. My art explores the intersection of societal norms, social media, and technology on women's psyche and emotions. I unpack the intricacies of women's roles by creating artworks that make a safe space for dialogue and introspection.

It was my personal journey of healing from domestic violence, together with a national identity crisis (as a Russian), and my research on the impact of social media, that led me to become a contemporary artist. I work in acrylic paint on canvas, allowing for spontaneity, experimentation, and subconscious automatic exploration of colour and line.

I donate a significant part of my profit to women's organizations, including Ukrainian women's aid and women's shelters.






CAISE MCLELLAN

Caise enjoys watching and listening to weird and unique stories while working on her art. She likes to share these stories with others in order to discuss those stories and hopefully bring forgotten tales to the front of people's consciences so we can learn from them.















I make and sell textiles under the name WEIRDO! Yarns in New Brunswick. Through my work, I like to tell stories. My knitting, yarns, handmade paper, and prints call people back to the tales I'm teaching people about. I've been called a good storyteller, and many people enjoy engaging in my retelling of forgotten stories. CIARA MYSHRALL

Ciara Myshrall, a maker of production tableware and sculptural pottery from Saint John, is driven by a profound lifelong desire for sensory discovery. Her work reflects this passion, combining soft and comforting forms with a mystical and spiritual essence in her designs. Hex Pottery was created by Myshrall to explore her many

interests through clay and colour. Myshrall holds a Certificate in Foundation Visual Arts, a Diploma in Ceramics, and a graduate certificate in Advanced Studio Practice from the New Brunswick College of Craft and Design. Pottery, for Myshrall, is a way to keep her hands in the mud and continue the magic of creating.



Under the name Hex Pottery, I create wheelthrown tableware and sculptural pots. My work is a product of a lifetime of sensory overload, where clay becomes my medium for pursuing sensory bliss and spiritual exploration. My grad work, titled Tourist, delves into society's relationship with Pigeons and Doves as a tourist in our concrete landscape, roaming in search of seeds and shelter. These birds were domesticated at least 4,000 years ago for companionship, and as a form of docile worker. Only within the last 100 years have we cast them away. The domestication of birds has spanned thousands of years, because of this, they still trust and seek us out. We take them for granted. Tourist is a call to consider how we cast away the nonhuman when they no longer serve us.






GRACE HALLEWELL

Grace Hallewell, a mixed-media artist, practices introspection and outrospection as part of her creative process. Her unique approach involves looking inwards to reflect on herself and outwards to understand her work through relations and empathy with others. This dual perspective is beautifully reflected in her body of work, which is a testament to her conceptual portraiture. Her compositions delve into the profound themes of connection and community, leaving a lasting impact on the art community. Hallewell's artistic journey has expanded beyond her art and writing to embrace curating. Her art has been showcased at the George Fry Gallery, the Charlotte Street Arts Centre, and the NBCCD Graduate

Exhibit at the Beaverbrook Art Gallery. In the past year, Hallewell has had the privilege of being mentored by Chris Donovan, a leading photographer in New Brunswick. This mentorship has been a transformative experience for Hallewell, pushing her to break free from the confines of her understanding of photography and venture into uncharted territories. Hallewell's artistic journey spans across continents. Born and raised in Bournemouth, southern England, she also has roots in Quispamsis, NB. Based in Fredericton, Hallewell leads a nomadic artistic life, frequently travelling. Her aspiration is to eventually bring her unique creative practice to the Netherlands, a testament to her global artistic ambitions.



For me, photography is about sharing a story, whether that is an old story that has passed or documenting one as it develops. This year, my understanding of what photography is and what it can be has been challenged, and this series, Young Lady, is a result of that. I spent months shutting down every idea I had, critiquing myself beyond belief, and making no progress in my creative practice. I decided to do an experiment to get around my roadblocks. I put my camera on a tripod, took a photo every 40 seconds, and then went on with my day. I quickly forgot about the camera, resulting in a candid self-portrait. Looking through the pictures afterwards, I realized I was genuinely seeing myself. There was no self-posing involved. No one was attempting to capture me when I looked good. I was just being documented and portrayed as I am. This approach to photography changed my creative process, and I've documented hours of myself and my life. In a way, it reminded me of stop-motion animation, something I am quite fond of. Some people may consider this a time-lapse, but I disagree. I showcase these works, not in quick succession like time-lapse. Instead, each photo is given time to exist in space, separate from its accompanying photographs. This installation is a tender appreciation for this period of my life before my upcoming wedding and my final graduation from NBCCD. This work is a profound part of my self-actualization journey and discovering my identity. It is about these gentle moments of domesticity and mundanity that have shaped me.


Girlhood



It has provided me the opportunity to learn about heritage quilt patterns, grouting, anchoring cumbersome things to a wall, and a little bit more about how I work as a person.

Dao's work has been shown in New Brunswick at the Governor House, Gallery 78, The George Fry Gallery. Additionally, her work has been shown nationally at Craft Council of BC, NSCAD in Nova Scotia, and OCAD in Ontario.



A Heart's Journey is a series of intricately designed pendants that serve as a visual narrative for the complex and transformative voyage of love amid life-altering choices. The project consists of three sterling silver pendants, each meticulously crafted to reflect a different stage of the heart's voyage, from initial confusion through grieving and mourning to the hopeful emergence of a new beginning. This series is the result of the changes and uncertainty that rock the foundation of a relationship. The first pendant shows a heart trapped in a maze, with red thread bursting out symbolising anger and confusion. The second pendant, a Victorian-inspired mourning locket, enclosing within it a lock of hair, is a grieving symbol. However, the final pendant, featuring the lotus, is a beacon of hope and resilience. The lotus, a symbol of transformation, resilience, and the promise of a new beginning, is a hopeful reminder to myself and those who choose to listen to my story that love will bloom again.






BECCA HANI FY


